- Today, a group of students travelled to Marian College, Ararat to compete against other Ballarat Diocesan secondary schools in Chess. I look forward to reporting on their success in the next newsletter.

- **Wednesday 22nd August:** Blocking sheet released.
- **Wednesday 29th August:** Final selections released.

Year of Grace III: Receiving and Giving

I recently attended the funeral of a very generous and gifted person, mourned by an extraordinarily diverse group of friends. The eulogist said "We shall mourn her, yes. We are sad, yes. But more importantly, we are grateful that she enriched our lives." Not a bad tribute, not a bad legacy – to enrich the lives of others. The Gospel reading for that funeral Mass contained an important instruction given by Jesus to his disciples when he sent them out to the surrounding villages. Jesus tells them not to take a walking staff or extra sandals or any money with them and to eat whatever is set before them. Matthew includes this additional instruction: "What you have received as a gift, give as a gift" (Mt 10:8).

Both Matthew and this eulogist expressed an essential ingredient of grace – while it is a free and undeserved gift from God, it a gift we are meant to share. In the words attributed to St Francis: *it is in giving that we receive. It is in pardoning that we are pardoned.* St Catherine of Siena put it this way: *the only reason to learn is to teach, the only reason to gain knowledge is to give it away.* That's why St Paul reminds us that: 'In his grace, God has given us different gifts for doing certain things well' (Romans 12:6). Those gifts are for sharing, they are given to be of service to others.

Grace is not something to be hoarded, something that we squirrel away, nor are the gifts and God-given talents with which we have been graced. Rather, with this free and undeserved help God reminds us that we were created as beings not just capable of being loved but also capable of loving. It is in the loving service of others that we find meaning and happiness. God gifts us with grace so that we can work for justice and peace, freedom and community. God gifted us with creation but also with the responsibility to be stewards of creation.

It is by grace that we come to participate in the very life of God and that brings with it a solidarity with all other members of God's creation and creation itself. Firstly, by our actions and words we can lead others to experience the living, creative and saving God who has not just captured our minds, but most importantly our hearts. Through the gift of grace we can discover God in the ordinary and help others to do the same. It is in our yearning for acceptance, companionship and recognition, our yearning for love, familiarity, closeness and companionship that we can come to know the beauty of a relationship with God and lead others to that same understanding. It is in our yearning for forgiveness, our desire to overcome hurt and pain that we can discover reconciliation with others and with God...and lead others to that discovery. There are times when life becomes monotonous, the daily drudge seems to drag us down and complacency and

mediocrity begin to take over – we yearn for new life, new ways. It is in loving and in reaching out to others that we come to know something of the joy and newness of discipleship and avoid what Jesus called 'hardness of heart'.

Through the gift of grace we can discover the presence of God in the wonders of creation. But creation is more than just a window to God – within it lies the seeds of our vocation. In the words of Pope Benedict:

Respect for creation is of immense consequence, not least because "creation is the beginning and the foundation of all God's works" and its preservation has now become essential for the peaceful coexistence of humankind. Man's inhumanity to man has given rise to numerous threats to peace and to authentic and integral human development – wars, international and regional conflicts, acts of terrorism, and violations of human rights. Yet no less troubling are the threats arising from the neglect – if not downright misuse – of the earth and the natural goods that God has given us. For this reason, it is imperative that humankind renew and strengthen "that covenant between human beings and the environment, which should mirror the creative love of God, from whom we come and towards whom we are journeying" (World Day of Peace Message 2011).

We live in a grace-filled world. It may be hard to see at times and events can shock and sadden us – God seems to be very distant. Caring for it and caring for those who are near and dear to us and those across the world who suffer from war and famine and hardship are graced activities. We need each other. We can be vehicles of God's grace to each other. Peace builds on the small acts of generosity, companionship, understanding and reconciliation that happen across the globe each day. Peace then becomes a habit rather than an unattainable dream. We need to care for the earth for it too is suffering from neglect, misuse and exploitation. We must hand it on to the next generation in far better shape than we received it. And that too begins at home.

What we have received as a gift, we must give as a gift. When we count our blessings there is so much we can and ought to do.

Where can I study Food Science, Food Technology Teaching, Nutrition and Dietetics?

You can study these course areas through TAFE and university. To find Victorian courses, go to www.vtac.edu.au

Dietetics: To become a qualified Dietitian, you need to study an approved degree at an institution such as Monash University or Charles Sturt University or an approved undergraduate and Masters degree at an institution such as Deakin. The La Trobe University is seeking accreditation for their Bachelor/ Master program.



Home Economics/ Food Technology Teaching:

You can study courses at universities such as Edith Cowan University Western Australia, Victoria University, Charles Sturt University and University of Tasmania

What subjects should I study at school? You should consider studying mathematics and sciences such as biology, food technology, chemistry, physical education and/ or VET Hospitality. If you would like to study the dietetics program at Monash University or Human Nutrition at La Trobe University you will need to study VCE Chemistry units 1 – 4.
