2013 Presentation Ball

Next Friday night, the Mercy Regional College community will gather expectantly for the annual Presentation Ball. Seventy-three excited Year 11 students have been practicing twice a week since the start of the year for this night and I am sure it will provide important memories, many photos and the chance to celebrate the journey these students have made towards adulthood.

This week, all Year 11 students received a letter from the Presentation Ball Coordinators outlining last minute reminders about arrangements for next Friday and I ask all parents to read these carefully. Parents' right to say no to teen drinking:

In some states in Australia it's still legal to serve someone who is under 18 with alcohol if it's in a private setting. This is throwing up issues for parents who have no control over their child's access to alcohol in other homes or a private party.

Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania and the Northern Territory have already addressed this loophole by bringing in "secondary supply" laws. The law states that a parent or equivalent must give consent before their child is given alcohol on a private premises. People who do supply the alcohol to underage drinkers without this consent are receiving hefty fines. In Victoria 42 people have already been fined over \$700.00 each since the secondary supply laws were brought in last year.

Sadly Western Australia, South Australia and the Australian Capital Territory are lagging behind. Parents are saying they need these laws to make a grey area clear. Parents don't all have the same view on underage drinking and it becomes difficult for a parent to prevent their child from drinking at a friend's house when they don't have a law behind them. In fact research has shown that approximately 30% of current drinkers aged 12 - 17 years received their last drink from a parent. In the worst cases teenagers have died and been badly injured after being given massive amounts of alcohol by parents of their friends.

Teenagers are also obtaining alcohol from older siblings, who under the secondary supply laws can receive similar fines to adults for supplying an underage drinker with alcohol. This is a lesser known part of the law and parents need to communicate this to their teenagers.

The National Health and Medical Research Council recommends young people under the age of 18 drink as little as possible in order to safeguard their health - secondary supply laws support that outcome by protecting young people in some hazardous situations.

I would ask that parents discuss the dangers of underage drinking and what can occur to a young person whose body has not developed to handle alcohol.

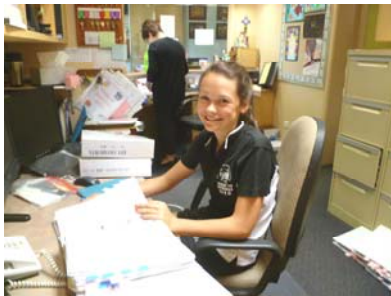

If your son missed out on this vaccine when we were recently at your school, and you agree that it is important that he has it, please make a call to either your local MCH nurse or contact the Corangamite Shire on 5593 7116 to arrange a catch up dose to enable your son to be slotted back into our school immunisations, at no cost to you, to complete all three vaccinations within the funded year.

At this time we hope to be back at your son's school in late May. There must be at least six to eight weeks between dose one and two, with dose three being due four to six months after dose two.
