In particular, the threat of violence in our own country and, in fact, in our state has brought home the reality that terrorism is not just an overseas or alien phenomenon. However, even more alarming to me has been the subtle yet determined suggestion that acts of terrorism and/or individual violence can be blamed upon a particular religious tradition and especially, the ancient and great faith of Islam. During the first week of the term three holidays I was given the opportunity to travel to Melbourne to be a part of the 2014 Melbourne Theatre Company Youth Scholarship Course, at MTC Headquarters. I was one of 24 students between the ages of 14-16 from around Victoria to be offered a spot in this Scholarship.

On the first day students from as far north as the border, (Wodonga) to as low south as the coast, (Timboon) were all welcomed into a giant rehearsal room and introduced to our Creative Directors Andrew and Jane. To break the ice Andrew and Jane told us not to speak but to introduce ourselves through improvisation and movement. That exercise ended with a lot of laughter and fun.

The topic for the week was 'Same, Same, but Different,' and we were constantly asked what this meant. During the week we learnt many different Performing Arts techniques such as stillness, speech and action, and concentrating on the technique of 'Focus.' We were asked to bring an object, photo, and a piece of music that is important to us in one way or another. This was a very emotional and moving exercise for many of the students.

We had the privilege of seeing 3 shows while we were in Melbourne. The first was an improvisation performance by the 'Play Back Theatre Company.' This performance involved the actors turning our personal stories into art.

The Second was at the State Theatre where we saw 'The Dream,' performed by the Bell Shakespeare Company. And the final show we saw was 'Marlin,' performed by the Melbourne Theatre Company.

After five fantastic days of learning so many aspects of the Performing Arts, and making some amazing new friends, we had the privilege of Performing for our families, our nominating teachers, and industry professionals.

Our performance was not a traditional scripted play; it was more a 'showcase' of all the acting techniques we had learnt. It included a music and rhythm number with sticks, full group activities that included movement portraying emotions, songs, still images and solo moments where we each took turns to perform a short solo inspired by the object that we had taken to the workshop at the start of the week.

My week at the MTC has been a life changing experience. It has been an eye opener to the world of The Performing Arts, and I have made life-long friends.

I would like to thank Janet Backhaus for nominating me for this amazing opportunity, and I would also like to thank Janet and Mr. Norman for travelling all the way to Melbourne to support and encourage me in the final performance.

I would also like to thank my Mum and Dad. They always encourage me to follow my dreams, and they made it possible for me to go to Melbourne to participate in the Scholarship course.

Performing Arts is definitely my passion and it is something that I will pursue in the future.

BATTLEFIELDS TOUR **FRANCE AND BELGIUM 2015**



Dear Parents and Students,

The College is looking for expressions of interest from students to participate in a trip to France, Belgium and England in September next year, 2015.

I offer the opportunity to all students from Years 9-12, who will be enrolled at Mercy Regional College in 2015. The trip is strictly optional and will take place in the last week of Term 3 and the first week of the September / October 2015 school holidays. I anticipate the trip will be for approximately 15 days.

The trip will focus on the experience of the Australians on the Western Front in the First World War. The group will visit Paris, the Somme region where Australians fought in the great and terrible battles of 1916 and in the campaigns of 1918. We will then travel to the Flanders region and the Ypres battlefields of Belgium, stopping on the way to visit the village of Fromelles where Australia's tragic first major battle in France was fought in July 1916. From Belgium we will travel to London where we will visit some of the sites of that great city as well as other places of interest in England's south.

A meeting will be held next term on **Monday 20th October** for all who have expressed interest already, or are interested. Those who wish to book a place on the tour will be required to pay a deposit of \$500.00. Further instalments may be made throughout next year with final numbers to be confirmed by June 2015.

In organising the tour, Mercy Regional College works in conjunction with Hello World Travel Agency, Camperdown.



EXAM PREPARATION TIPS

Exams are just around the corner for many students and it is essential to be prepared. Please find below study tips that assisted Jake and Joanne to cope with exam preparation.

Jake Curtis, Bachelor of Commerce, University of Melbourne

My top 3 tips for exam preparation:

- 1) Drink plenty of water and exercise as a study break. It motivates you to work hard at the desk!
- 2) Productivity snowballs. One hard core study day motivates you to do the same the next day.
- 3) Set achievable goals, e.g., I wrote an English essay every morning before breakfast- good start to the day and very do-able.

Procrastination:

- Five minute rule: Knowing you have a big task to do can be overwhelming, although five minutes of study is easier to motivate yourself. Tell yourself to study for five minutes and set a timer and usually you would be on a role to keep going even further than the intended five minutes.

EXAM PREPARATION TIPS

- Social media can be a distraction; therefore I would recommend a computer application called 'Self-Control' (found through Google). This application allows you to ban yourself from any site such as Facebook and YouTube for an amount of time that you choose.

Motivation to study:

- Inspiration board – This can help to visually see your end goals. On my inspiration board, I have quotes and pictures of the career that I am currently studying for at university. In Year 12, I also had my desired ATAR on my wall that I saw everyday. You could also set your computer screen to have pictures/quotes to inspire you.

Other tips:

- Highlighters- Highlighting key information helps to break down long paragraphs of texts when re-reading information. I also used highlighters in tests to highlight the key words in each question.
- Learning definitions through flash cards – I would film myself saying the definitions and then play it back and check the flash cards to see if I was correct.
- Complete a range of past exams: This allows you encounter a variety of questions that could be similar on the exam as well as get practice on different topics. Getting feedback from doing these practice exams and looking at suggested solutions can help to further improve and understand what the marker is looking for. I also time myself so that I get used to the conditions of the exam.
- After reading a section of a textbook, make a few dot points in relation to what you have just read. I like to write in the textbook (in pencil) next to the paragraph that I have just read or on sticky notes and stick them in the textbook; this allows you to know if you can fully comprehend the information.
