


2.1 The O'Keeffe Campus

2.4 College Uniform Expectations

School uniform is compulsory and students are expected to maintain high standards of personal grooming and neatness and to take pride in their College uniform. All students are expected to wear full school uniform while at school.

Students are offered the choice of a *trans-seasonal uniform*, i.e. the uniform can be worn in accordance with the weather. However, students must wear either the full summer or full winter uniform, not a combination of both.

Any student not wearing full uniform is to bring a note from his/her parents, written in the Student Diary and to be given to the Homeroom teacher, explaining the reason for being out of uniform and the expected length of time the student will be out of uniform. Students are advised to mark their name on all items of uniform and personal property brought to school.

Sports uniform must be worn during PE class. Students who are unable to wear the correct sports uniform must bring a note from their parents. O'Keeffe students are permitted to wear their correct PE uniform to school for the day, only when they have PE practical class. In winter students will be encouraged to wear the new College logo tracksuit pants.

During cooler months students are permitted to wear only the MRC spray jacket as an over garment for protection from the weather. During Terms 1 and 4 students are to wear a College hat during recess and lunchtime.

Upon a breach of the uniform guidelines a warning by the Homeroom teacher will be given first. A second breach results in a level one tracing incident recorded on SIMON.













2.5 Grooming

Students are expected to maintain a high standard of personal grooming and neatness and to take pride in their College uniform.

Jewellery - Girls/Boys:

Must be discreet and can include any of the following:

- Two pairs of earrings are permitted per ear studs/plain earrings. If nose is pierced, only a clear plastic retainer or stud less than 2 mm is acceptable.
- · No visible tattoos are allowed.

Hair:

Must be clean and tidy.

- Collar length hair must be fully tied back. Partially tied up hair is not permitted.
- No extremes in hair styles, e.g. dreadlocks or spiked hair, extreme hair shaving or colours.
- · Navy, white or maroon ribbons/hair ties.
- Facial Hair: Boys must be clean shaven at all times.
- Make-up: No visible make-up or nail polish are allowed.

2.6 Book Collection

Orders placed by the due date, 11 December 2022, will be available from the week beginning Monday 9 January 2023 from our Retail Service Centre of Campion Education at 169 Fairy Street Warrnambool. All orders must be fully pre-paid.

Orders placed by the due date will receive discounted delivery and will be delivered (via Australia Post) by Wednesday 25 January 2023. Due to supply chain challenges, your delivery may arrive outside the original estimated delivery timeframe.

Orders can still be placed after the due date by visiting Campion website or Retail Service Centre. Full stock availability cannot always be guaranteed for orders placed after the due date. During late January to early February, Retail Service Centres encounter high volumes and you may experience some queues and delays during this time. 2.7 Lunch Orders

There is no canteen at the O'Keeffe Campus but lunch orders are available 5 days a week and are supplied by 'The Shed' cafe at Noorat. Students place their orders in their Homeroom tubs at the beginning of the day. The menu is available on MRc website - www.mercy.vic.edu.au/student-life/canteen.

2.8 Student Absences

Parents are required to notify the school if their child is going to be absent or will be arriving late to school. Notification can be given via PAM, phone or email *reception@ mercy.vic.edu.au*. It is a legal requirement that the school follow up all student absences and a reason noted. Any student who is marked absent from period without notification will be followed up with an *SMS message* asking the parent to contact the school. Do not reply to the SMS message – please telephone the appropriate campus to explain the absence.

The O'Keeffe Campus Office will be closed when there are no students at Noorat, e.g. Sports Days/Masses, etc. Please ring the McAuley Campus on *5593 2011* with any absences.

Notification of absences for holidays during school term needs to be given at least two weeks in advance in writing addressed to the Principal.

3. BUS TRAVEL

School staff will be at the following connection points on the first day of Term 1.

Cobden Technical School from 8.30am McAuley Campus, Camperdown from 8.30am

Where fitted, seat belts must be worn on buses. Misbehavior on buses may result in a student's suspension from bus travel for a period of time. Please contact the College *IMMEDIATELY* if your child encounters any problems with bus travel.

Students will be advised well in advance of any changes to bus arrangements, e.g. whole school events at the McAuley Campus.

3.1 Bus Passes

Many of the College buses are at or near capacity and only a limited number of requests will be able to be granted. All passes will be issued at the discretion of the Principal. Consideration will only be given to requests for ongoing sporting/music/after school activities **BUT NOT** for social reasons such as birthday parties or sleep overs.

Parents requesting bus passes will need to complete the 'Bus Pass Request' form and submit to the school office 2 days prior to when the bus pass is needed for the request to be considered.

Bus passes on the state coordinated bus runs are issued under their policies and guidelines. For some of the bus runs this means, no bus passes can be issued.




4. SIMON & PAM

The online platform *Parent Access Module (PAM)* is an invaluable tool for parents. Its user-friendly format allows parents to observe and follow aspects of their child's school activities. Parents have access to MRC's daily messages and upcoming events and each student has a customised profile.

In the student profile parents can track test results, assignment tasks and overdue homework. Parents also have access to daily timetable, classroom behavior, roll attendance and school reports. PAM is very easy to navigate and is great as another form of communication between the school and home.

Your PAM username and password have been provided with your enrolment confirmation pack. Easy access to PAM is available from the homepage of MRC website.





5. CLASS COMPOSITION

We endeavour to group your child with at least one or more other students from their previous school. These students may *NOT* be your child's closest or best friends - your encouragement and strategies for resilience in this situation would be appreciated, as once selected it is very hard to change.

With approximately 70 students to allocate into classes, equal gender mixes needed, ability levels catered for and allocation of aides, it is not always possible to cater for every child's friendship requests. Students have the chance to mix before and after school and at recess and lunch.

For some students the first few days may be a little challenging, but all students are encouraged to make new friendships and the camp is often a great factor in making new friends. We encourage students to persevere in this area and be resilient - and by Week 3 all students are usually very settled.

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7. FIRST WEEKS OF SCHOOL

7.1 The First Day

Wednesday, 1 February 2023

- Students should be in full uniform, including a hat.
- All belongings should be labeled with a student's name. This should include all clothing, books and equipment.
- Students need to bring their own lunch, a drink bottle, a pencil case and an exercise book.
- There is no need to bring text books on the first day.
- The Homeroom teacher will advise what to bring for the rest of the week.
- Student MacBooks will be distributed during Week 1 and 2 of Term 1.





7.2 Student Timetable

- One piece bathers are required for girls.

7.6 Year 7 Camp


Wednesday, 15 February - Friday, 17 February 2023

8. MACBOOK PROGRAM

All students at Mercy Regional College receive an Apple MacBook as part of their enrolment.

- The MacBook is provided for students in Years 7-9 as part of their College fees.
- The College supplies a carry bag and clip-on hardcover at no charge.
- The MacBook is subsidised by the College to keep the rental below what it would cost you to purchase your own.
- The College retains ownership of the MacBook which is handed back at the completion of Year 9.
- The MacBooks are bundled with a 3-year AppleCare+ Warranty which covers accidental damage (including screen breakages).
- 'Theft' and 'Water Damage' are not covered under warranty or insurance and the parent is liable for the full cost of replacing a lost, stolen or water damaged MacBook.

When students move to Year 10, they can decide the best MacBook to suit their subject focus heading into Senior classes. Parents do have the option to purchase the MacBook outright up front or repay over 6 monthly repayments.



9. HOMEWORK & STUDY

Homework is beneficial when it is specific, has a purpose, and reinforces learning. It can help students practice skills learned in class and develop further understanding of key concepts. We strongly encourage reading as a priority - class texts and wider reading for interest and enjoyment.

Completing homework on a regular basis develops good work habits, but we also acknowledge that a balance is vital. Time spent with family and friends after school, in a range of activities and commitments is very important, and encouraged.

Students can expect some regular homework. Making effective use of class time is the best strategy to keep up-to-date with school work. Parents can monitor class, assessment and homework tasks via PAM (Parent Access Module) online. We encourage communication between parents and teachers, via a note in the student's diary or email.

The time students need to complete tasks at home varies, but should not be excessive. Extended assignments or project work can be daunting for some students. Making the most of class time and breaking the task into smaller chunks is advisable, rather than leaving it to the last minute. Staff are very happy to support students with this when needed. There is generally no prescribed holiday homework for Years 7-10, however, the reading of English texts is an expectation. Text details are regularly published in school newsletters or emails home.

Examples of homework & study tasks:

- Reading (15-30 minutes per night is suggested)
- Maths Online tasks (1 hour per week)
- Preparing for a test with revision notes or practice questions
- Finishing off a task not completed in class
- Catching up on work missed while absent
- Watching the news or a documentary
- Reading newspapers and magazines

10. INCREASING PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT AT SCHOOL

At the O'Keeffe Campus we would like to provide opportunities for our Year 7 & 8 parents to be actively involved in the school, not only to support teaching and learning but to also continue to build a sense of community where our students and parents feel a belonging to our great College. Activities include *Community Morning Teas* and *Special Persons' Day.* We understand that not all parents can be involved due to commitments.

Further information will also be sent home early in Term 1.

10.1 Special Persons' Day

Term 3

Grandparents & Special Friends Day is an opportunity to celebrate the many important people in the lives of our students and also gives our Year 7's the chance to celebrate and share their school. The day includes morning tea, performances and classroom visits.





11. MOBILE PHONES

Any student who has a mobile phone at school must have it recorded on the College register. Please obtain a form from the office. No student is to use a mobile phone while at school. If students are found using a phone it will be taken from them. Please refer to our digital technology policy on the College website for more details.

Students are not to contact parents directly via email, phone or text if they are unwell. They must notify their teacher or the office and contact will be made with a parent by a staff member.

11.1 Messages to Students

Students can only be called to the office at recess, lunch or at the end of school bell to receive messages from parents.

11.2 Student Emergency Contacts and Pick Up Arrangements

During the enrolment process, parents nominated contacts for their students in case of an emergency. Anyone already nominated can pick up your child from school. Occasionally students need to be picked up by someone not already on the list. If this is the case, please contact the office or send a note outlining the arrangements. This also applies if students are going home via a different method, e.g. with other students or walking to sporting commitments.

12. MERCY MERITS PROGRAM

The Mercy Merits Commendation Program is used to complement positive behaviours and to encourage and acknowledge students who strive for personal growth. Personal growth at Mercy is demonstrated through students displaying a positive attitude towards their learning, peers, teachers, and the Mercy community. Mercy Merits encourages a student involvement in various aspects of our College community and the wider community.

The Mercy Merits are recorded on SIMON under student commendations where students can see them, parents will also be able to access this information on PAM. These commendations will accumulate to encourage students to strive towards *Mercy Merit Awards*. The Mercy Merits reflect our school's core values. Mercy Merits will be achieved by students will also contribute to the *House Award*, *The McLeod Shield*. Students can achieve commendations in recognition of personal achievement and growth in the following categories:

- Learning Growth: Individual's growth in school work.
- Acts of Mercy: Assisting and helping others in our community and the wider community.
- Leadership and Positive Role: Examples of positive student leadership/College representation.
- The Arts & Cultural: Examples of student involvement across arts and culture.
- **Sport:** Representation and achievement in College sport only.

Students who accumulate 20 commendation points (which must have a minimum of 2 achievements in each of these categories) will be awarded with a Bronze Merit award.

Students who accumulate 50 commendation points (which must be in at least 2 different categories and have a minimum of 3 achievements) will be awarded with a Silver Merit award.

Students who accumulate 110 commendation points (which must be in at least 3 different categories and have a minimum of 2 achievements) will be awarded with a Gold Merit award.

13. STUDENT WELLBEING

The wellbeing of our students at Mercy Regional College is central to all that we do. The student's wellbeing is every teacher's responsibility and we work to ensure all students are happy and feel safe in our College environment. The Home Room teacher is the first person to contact should there be any concerns with your child. We have a *Wellbeing Team* consisting of *the O'Keeffe Community Leader, Mrs Emily Stephens; Deputy Principal - Staff & Students, Mrs Berni Sinnott; College Pastoral Care Worker, Mrs Sharon Suhan.* Their role is to provide support to the students, not only involving mental health of the individual but also allowing them to grow as a person by guiding each individual to make decisions for themselves. We provide students with resources and materials with the goal to help and assist young people in making positive decisions about their lifestyle taking into consideration the values of their family, school and culture. One of the major barriers and challenges is improving access to information and services for young people. We work with the student and parents.



13.1 MERCY (Mindfulness, Empathy, Resilience, Care, You)

Mercy is a dedicated pastoral care program that includes lessons from the Resilience Project, Positive Education Institute and Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships. MERCY lessons are held in homeroom groups and are centered around resilience, empathy, mental health, respectful relationships and emotional literacy.

14. COLLEGE EXPECTATIONS
